Safeguarding spotlight: Help your child use safe routines on the journey to and from school — small habits like walking with awareness make a big difference.

Recognising the importance of safeguarding, I have been visiting pupils around the school to talk about how safe they feel and whether they know who they can turn to if they ever have worries or concerns. I was delighted that every pupil spoken to could name a range of trusted adults — from parents to school staff. They also recognised the special adults in school who have a dedicated role in keeping children safe: myself, Mrs Smith and Mrs Patel. These conversations also gave me the chance to check how well the recent online safety learning had been understood. Pupils were able to explain clearly how to stay safe online and what to do if something worries them.

In our assembly today, to raise awareness of National Recycling Week (September 14th to September 20th), I enjoyed reading 'A Planet full of plastic' to the whole school. We discussed the importance of recycling and I have encouraged the pupils to get involved by recycling more at home. Safeguarding

To keep all pupils safe, our school gates remain locked until 3:10pm each afternoon. Classes regularly use the outdoor spaces right up to hometime for outdoor learning, PE, Wellbeing time and playtime, so keeping the gates closed ensures pupils can move, learn and play safely within the grounds.

When the gates open at 3:10pm, we ask parents to queue to the left-hand side of the entrance. Queuing on the right can block the bus stop and cause congestion for the wider community so your support with this helps us keep the area safe and respectful for everyone.



There is no need to arrive early or queue. Families who come between 3:15 and 3:20 can usually walk straight through the one-way system without waiting, making collection smoother and more comfortable. The one-way system also helps staff hand pupils over safely and calmly to their adults — a process that external reviewers have recognised as an effective safeguarding system. Thank you for helping us maintain a safe, respectful and well-organised end to the school day.

School Garden

Our school garden has been thriving over the summer, with pupils excited to see how much has grown. Unfortunately, our sweetcorn didn't survive a visit from some unexpected four-legged guests — our cameras caught foxes sneaking in and enjoying the entire crop! Despite this, the garden has produced a wonderful harvest of tomatoes, beetroot, beans and onions, which pupils have been able to explore and learn from first-hand.

We will be working on improving our carrots, which have grown into rather peculiar shapes again this year, but that's all part of the fun of learning how different vegetables grow. Our squash and pumpkins are developing brilliantly and we look forward to sharing more updates on these very soon.

In the coming weeks, our new Eco-Committee members will be selected. They will take on the responsibility of sowing the next round of vegetables that can grow through the winter, helping us continue to build a sustainable and exciting garden space for all pupils.

Well done to our boys' football team who attended a tournament. You demonstrated many of school values as you represented our school.

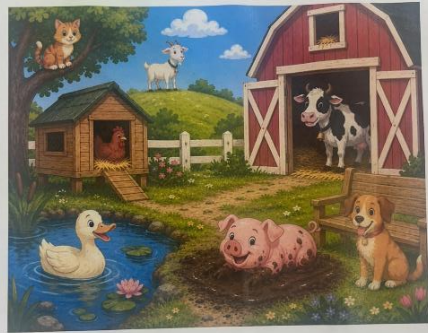

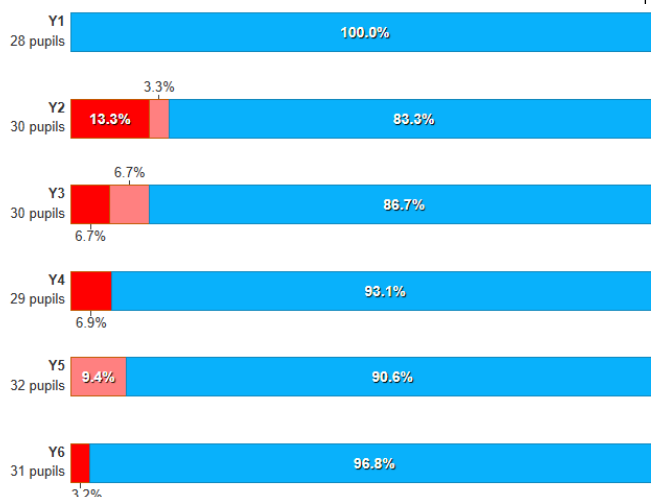


Attendance
